School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2022–23)

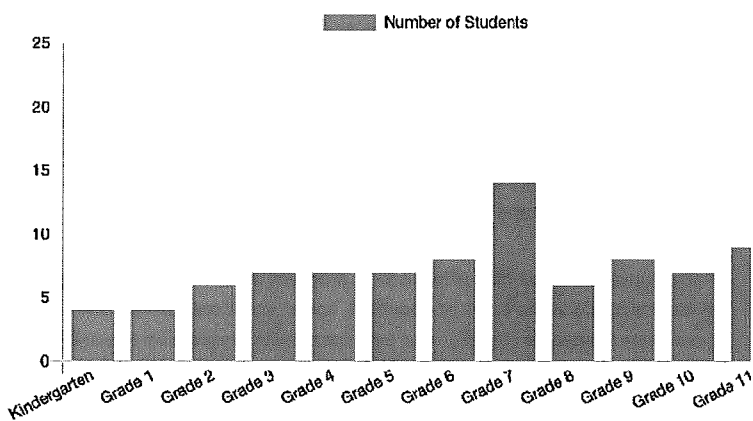

Point Quest El Dorado Hills support services include: effective behavior intervention instruction, pre-vocational, social skills and life skills development, case management, and psychiatric services. Extracurricular activities include community-based instruction to local businesses, vocational activities, and student council. Related Services include counseling and guidance, and social work services to support students mental health needs, speech and language intervention, occupational therapy, behavior implementation-development, as well as vocational education and career development. All related service providers are supervised by the administrative staff in accordance with each profession's best practices.

Yearly events are held for the purpose of parent participation, networking and conferencing with the teachers. 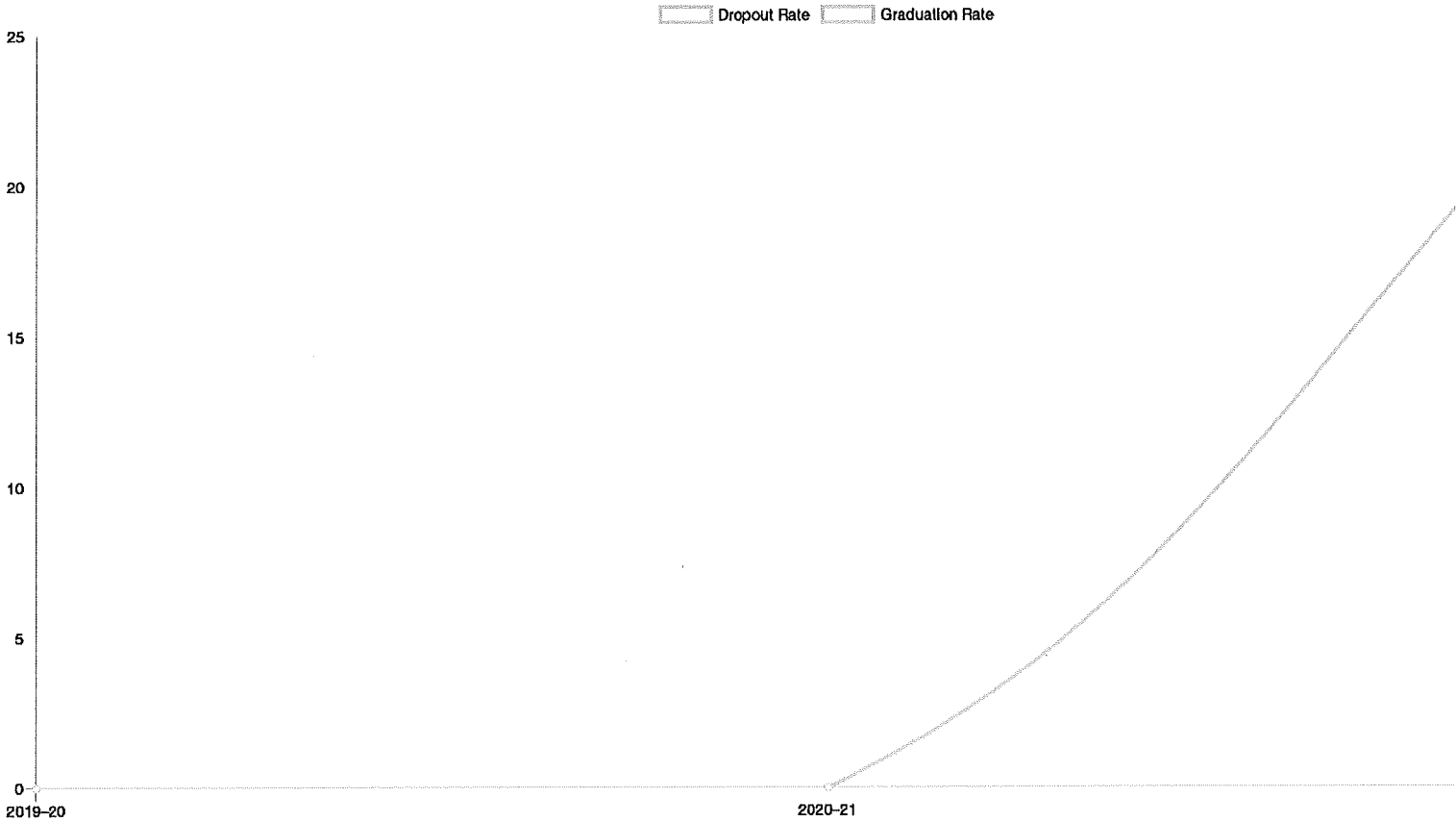

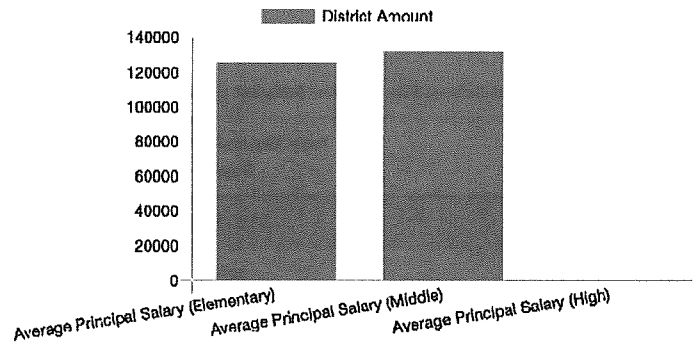
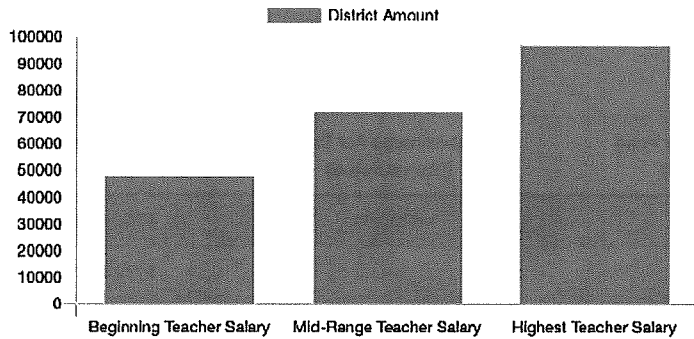
